Report from the Chair

My second and final year as Chair of the Board has been characterized by new initiatives for the Alliance.

The executive director participated in a review of programs at the Provincial Correctional Centre. As a result, inmates are making and donating Storysacks to the Provincial Library Service. This initiative has encouraged some links to the community for inmates and encouraged a few to seek further literacy training.

Destination Employment, a job experience program for people with learning disabilities, found a home at the Alliance office again this year. This HRDCsponsored program has operated across Canada for a number of years and this year we were lucky to hire Blaine Hrabi and then Sandra LeBlanc to implement it for us.

In April we invited Gail MacDougall, an instructor at Foothills Academy, to present workshops on reading strategies for teachers and parents to use with children. She also gave a public presentation. This was one of a series of initiatives that helped the Alliance foster the renewed Learning Disabilities Association of PEI. This new association is working hard to raise public and government awareness of learning disabilities. 2003 - 2004 Annual Report

In November of 2004 we are presenting a Provincial Literacy Summit in Charlottetown. The Summit has gathered a huge amount of interest. Even at this early stage it appears this will be a successful and important event.

We hope the Summit will lay the foundation for an action agenda for literacy in PEI including strategies for influencing policy direction, common guidelines for new and renewed literacy initiatives, plus plans for various literacy communities to work together to improve literacy for all PEI citizens.

I wish to thank fellow Board members who have willingly shared their wisdom and been very patient with me. The dedicated staff, Catherine and Norman, have always been supportive, never failing to keep me informed. I extend to them sincere thanks for their generosity during my years on this Board. We are a very fortunate organization to have them working for us.

Now, in my upcoming year as Past Chair, I hope to watch my successor have the same rewarding experience I had as Chair of the PEI Literacy Alliance.

Executive Director's report

We have had another busy year at the Alliance. Our mission statement: "The PEI Literacy Alliance advances literacy for the people of Prince Edward Island" defines the scope of our activities.

This was the first year of a new three-year funding cycle. We had some new initiatives and repeated some successful activities.

Some of our major efforts were:

• completing and distributing of "Fact Sheets on Social Assistance in PEI"

• help to establish the revived Learning Disabilities Association of PEI

• planning and organizing the 2004 Literacy Summit: advancing the literacy agenda

The Literacy Summit is planned for November 4 and 5, 2004.

We hope it will bring together people from across the Island with an interest in literacy policy. Community groups, business and government partners have been invited to attend.

Our board defines the direction for the organization through its

"ENDS" or outcome statements, while the job of the executive director is to determine how to work toward these "ENDS."

This year we added a fourth statement to our list. When the Board has defined the ENDS statements and added any elaboration to them then, the Executive Director gives a reasonable interpretation of the ENDS and decides how best to use the resources available to complete the work.

Here is a recap of our ENDS or outcome statements.

END #1

Gaps and overlaps in literacy services to adult learners and their families will be decreased.

Organizations with an interest in literacy will share information about trends, issues and successes.

END #2

Barriers to people with low literacy levels will be reduced.

Adult learners will know how to access opportunities for learning.

People's learning needs will be properly identified. Islanders will be able to use the printed material commonly found in the home, at work and in the community.

END #3

Islanders will be better informed about the costs of low literacy on economic, cultural, political and social aspects of life.

Federal and Provincial policy-makers will be better informed.

Families will be better informed about the costs of low literacy.

Member organizations will be better informed about the costs of low literacy.

END #4

Literacy will be valued and celebrated across PEI.

Families will know about the value of literacy and will recognize their role in promoting it

On the following pages I have briefly described some of our projects. I have also listed the conferences and workshops we attended, the committees we worked on and people we met throughout 2003-2004.

In April we met with Lynne Lalonde and Tom Vigneaut of the National Literacy Secretariat. They encouraged us to submit a proposal for an evaluation workshop that we hope to hold in the fall. This workshop will train a small group of trainers from each Atlantic province so they can in-turn provide information to community groups in their own provinces. We have also received some NLS funding for the 2004 Literacy Summit.

I'd like to thank the board of directors and especially Chair Nora for her support during this hectic year.

Thanks again to Norman Finlayson the excellent office manager and technical wizard at the Alliance who offers sober second thought at all times. Your teamwork and support helps make the Alliance a success.

Treasurer's Report

The Alliance has fared well this year. We completed the first year of our three-year funding cycle. The annual report describes some of the activities carried out using these funds.

Destination Employment, a job experience program for people with learning disabilities was hosted at the Alliance again this year. We received funds from the Learning Disabilities Association of Canada through a Canada-wide HRDC program to hire a regional coordinator to deliver the program. This project was renewed for 2004-2005.


The **2003 Summer Tutoring Program for Kids** received funding through HRDC from their Summer Career Placement program. Twenty-one tutors, mostly Education students, provided one-to-one tutoring for up to 600 children last summer. Other sponsors included the school boards, the Department of Education, Provincial Library Service and the Community Development Bureau.

The **2003 PGI Golf Tournament for Literacy** raised over \$28,000 for literacy in PEI. The money was distributed through ten \$500 bursaries to adult learners, three \$1500 scholarships for post-secondary education, support for the LEARN Line and other initiatives of the Alliance.

On the advice of our auditors we have overspent this year by about \$9,500 to reduce our surplus. The Alliance continues on a sound financial footing and we have savings in the event that any funding sources become unavailable. This spring the board initiated a program of literacy grants to spend some of these savings to advance literacy in PEI. Our proposed Literacy Summit in November will also use some of our savings. These expenditures will be reflected in next year's financial statements.

We have had a very productive year and have used our project funds to move literacy forward in PEI.
