Report from the Chair

This past year (2004-2005) has been a very successful one for the PEI Literacy Alliance. It has been a great privilege to work with all the current Board members, our Executive Director Catherine O'Bryan and Office Manager Norman Finlayson, as well as the many learners, educators, community members and decision-makers that I have had the pleasure to meet this year.

One of the key things I learned this year is that we have a strong literacy community in Prince Edward Island. We have many dedicated and hard-working people in the public and private sectors who are committed to raising literacy levels in all areas of our society. These people know what needs to be done and what it will take to make things better. Our primary focus this year has been to lobby our provincial and community leaders to stress the urgent need to map out a new vision for PEI, one that is rooted in policies and programs which will increase literacy levels for all Islanders.

The PEI Literacy Alliance has made important contributions to the efforts to raise public awareness of the urgent literacy needs across the province. Through our leadership, our innovative programs and services, as well as several new initiatives this year, the PEI Literacy Alliance is strengthening and broadening its role as a powerful voice for learners,

and as an effective, community-based organization. I have listed a few of the key accomplishments made this year – not by me, Catherine, Norm or by our Board members alone, but through the collaborative efforts of all the partners and supporters we were able to mobilize under the PEI Literacy Alliance umbrella.

Leadership

- √ We have been able to increase our profile with policy-makers, politicians and the general public. The PEI Literacy Summit, held November 2004, spotlighted literacy issues across the province and brought recognition to the role of the PEI Literacy Alliance in the province.
- √ We met with the Premier and
 Minister of Education on two
 occasions as part of the planning and
 de-briefing of the PEI Literacy
 Summit and gained their respect as a
 key community voice for literacy and
 learners.
- √ We were successful in lobbying the Premier to bring statistician Scott Murray to a full government caucus meeting to hear the sobering statistics on literacy in PEI and to explore what policy makers need to do to turn things around.
- √ We published and distributed widely the PEI Literacy Summit Report

- which highlighted the key principles developed by Summit participants. (See page 8-9)
- √ We contributed to regional and national discussions on new initiatives in literacy.
- √ As a key partner, we worked with the Provincial Literacy Secretariat consulting on all issues related to literacy in PEI.
- √ We prepared and presented a brief to the Premier's Task Force on Student Achievement covering several major literacy issues affecting families and adults in PEI.

 "Fostering Plain Language in Public Education" and

Healthy Public Policy". Both of these projects contain elements of research.

√ We are building in research to all our current projects, programs and future initiatives.

I am happy to report that we have strong people joining the Board for next year, as well as experienced returning members ready to take leadership in all of these areas.

The Board and the office staff, Catherine and Norm of PEI Literacy Alliance will continue to lobby to be included, to be invited to "sit at the table" with community and government leaders. We will continue to speak clearly and loudly for the literacy needs of all Islanders. And we will work with passion and commitment to build a "culture for literacy" in PEI which is the foundation of all our futures.

Executive Director's report

We have had another active year at the Alliance. Our mission statement: "The PEI Literacy Alliance advances literacy for the people of Prince Edward Island" defines the scope of our activities.

This was the second year of a new three-year funding cycle. We had some new initiatives and repeated some successful activities.

Our major effort for 04-05 was planning and presenting the **2004 Literacy Summit:** advancing the literacy agenda. On November 4 and 5 we brought together 125 people from across the Island with an interest in literacy policy.

Community groups, business, education and government partners all attended.

As a result of our Summit, we met with the government caucus and arranged for Scott Murray from Statistics Canada to give them a presentation on literacy and the economy. Since then the Premier has committed to presenting a literacy summit of his own with key policy people in attendance.

We will continue to build on this success. Our Board defines the direction for the organization through its "ENDS" or outcome statements, while the job of the executive director is to determine how to work toward these "ENDS."

When the Board has defined the ENDS statements and added any elaboration to them then, the Executive Director interprets these statements and decides how best to use the resources available to complete the work.

Here is a recap of our ENDS or outcome statements with some of the activities designed to help achieve these ENDS.

END A

Gaps and overlaps in literacy services to adult learners and their families will be decreased.

Organizations with an interest in literacy will share information about trends, issues and successes.

To help achieve this END we:

• co-sponsored the first Literacy Research Network (LRN) meeting with UPEI

- submitted a Population Health proposal titled "Promoting Literacy in Healthy Public Policy". It has been approved.
- held our semi-annual meeting
- attended a Knowledge Brokering workshop
- met with NLS program officers Lynne Lalonde and Tom Vigneault
- completed and distributed a Project Evaluation and Organizational Assessment handbook
- attended a workshop titled "Under the microscope accountability in the public sector"
- organized a "CABS on-line" in-service assessment workshop for adult education staff
- produced and distributed the 2004 Summit final report

END B

Barriers to people with low literacy levels will be reduced.

Adult learners will know how to access opportunities for learning. People's learning needs will be properly identified.

Islanders will be able to use the printed material commonly found in the home, at work and in the community.

To help achieve END B we:

- supported a Library Card distribution project through the Family Literacy Network of the Children's Working Group for Healthy Child Development
- produced and distributed a LEARN Line brochure outlining educational resources available for adult learners
- edited the *Seniors United Network* newsletter for plain language
- prepared a presentation for the Task Force on Education
- participated on the Learning Disabilities
 Professional Development Committee
- prepared and distributed a brochure about "Building For Tomorrow" -- a conference sponsored by Laubach Literacy PEI

- edited the provincial Student Loan applications for plain language
- prepared a proposal for an NLS project titled "Promoting Literacy in Public Education". This proposal has been approved.

END C

Islanders will be actively engaged in building their literacy and learning skills for the benefit of their economic, cultural, political, social and personal aspects of life.

Federal and Provincial policy-makers will be better informed.

Families will be better informed about the costs of low literacy.

Member organizations will be better informed about the costs of low literacy.

To help achieve END C we:

- wrote a letter to Premier Binns requesting his support for the Literacy Summit
- presented the highly successful Literacy Summit
- met with the Premier following the Summit to discuss next steps

- organized for Scott Murray of Statistics Canada to meet with caucus
- attended two meetings of the Movement for Canadian Literacy in Ottawa
- planned and presented the PGI Golf Tournament for Literacy
- sponsored and administered the Summer Tutoring Program for Kids

- sponsored a Family Literacy Carousel to celebrate Family Literacy Day

Production of action agenda

The Literacy Summit participants produced seven principles to guide the literacy action agenda. Each principle was elaborated with steps to realize our literacy goals:

Principle 1: Value Literacy Throughout our Lives

- Redefine literacy in broader contemporary terms to foster literacy for a diverse, learning society.
- Develop vigorous marketing strategies to raise awareness of the influence of literacy on every aspect of our social and economic well-being.
- Promote a change in attitudes so literacy becomes valued across the province.
- Establish high literacy expectations across the province.

Principle 2: Tackle Learning Challenges

- Emphasize literacy as part of lifelong learning.
- Develop inclusive learning practices and high quality, lifelong learning programs for all.
- ☐ Create assessment measures to include the identification, diagnosis and intervention of all learning needs.

Principle 3: Invest in Families

- Emphasize prevention, not intervention in family and early childhood policies and programs.
- Develop policies that improve the quality of early childhood support for literacy.

Principle 4: Cultivate the Learning Workplace

- Develop policies, which overcome urban and rural disparities and which increase tolerance, social cohesion, and equitable distribution of economic opportunity.
- Develop policies that decrease inequalities in literacy and invest resources in comprehensive long-term strategies for breaking the cycle of poverty and low literacy.
- Create incentives for employers and employees to develop long-term strategies for improving literacy in their workplace.

Principles 5: Employ Existing and New Resources

- Project current and new literacy research into productive social and economic practices.
- Organize and network current and new resources.
- Create a centralized resource base.

Principle 6: Mobilize Communities

- Create and pilot community-based literacy models.
- Empower communities to identify local areas of need and to find solutions tailored for that community.

Principle 7: Create Integrated Policies, Programs and Services

- Build and integrate literacy policies and programs for cohesion within and across jurisdictions to maximize results.
- Encourage strong, cohesive partnerships among literacy communities and advocates.
- ☐ Create more integration within and among family, school, workplace and community literacy initiatives.

Treasurer's Report

The Alliance has fared well this year. We completed the second year of our three-year funding cycle. The annual report describes some of the activities carried out using these funds.

Destination Employment, a job experience program for people with learning disabilities was hosted at the Alliance again this year. We received funds from the Learning Disabilities Association of Canada through a Canada-wide HRDC program to allow a regional coordinator to deliver this successful program. After three years we have handed over the management of this program to the Learning Disabilities Association of PEI. They are currently waiting to move into new offices.

The **Summer Tutoring Program for Kids** received funding through HRDC from their Summer Career Placement program. Twenty-one tutors, mostly Education students, provided one-to-one tutoring for over 600 children in the summer. Other sponsors included all the school boards, the Department of Education, Provincial Library Service and the Rotary Club of Charlottetown.

The **PGI Golf Tournament for Literacy** was a tremendous success raising money for literacy in PEI. The money is distributed through \$500 bursaries to adult learners, three \$1500 scholarships for post-secondary education and support for the LEARN Line. This year it helped fund our highly successful **Literacy Summit**.

The Alliance continues on a sound financial footing and we have savings in the event that any funding sources become unavailable. We have had a very productive year and have used our project funds to move literacy forward in PEI.
