Across the country the definition of literacy and essential skills and how it relates to the lives of Canadians continues to evolve. The Alliance has effectively met this changing mandate by addressing PEI's literacy needs through innovative programs and services, community involvement and partnerships.

With three full-time staff the Alliance continues finding ways to create new initiatives and be more active in the Island community each year. Since completing the strategic plan the goals and objectives have been put into motion by board members and staff in areas of project development, fundraising, finances and administration.

A Human Resources Plan and Communications Plan were also developed with the help of Steve McQuaid and Kerry-Anne MacDougall respectively. The objective of the Human Resources Plan is to incorporate management systems to help achieve our mission and overall success of the organization, while meeting the needs of all employees. The Communications Plan is above all a means to monitor our communications efforts, but also a tool for effectively discovering new opportunities, optimizing challenges and initiating change.

The PEILA also hosted a meeting of Atlantic Literacy Coalitions in the spring, which was an overwhelming success. The symposium was a great opportunity for colleagues in the Atlantic Provinces to discuss important issues, share ideas and network with provincial literacy leaders. Gaps and overlaps in literacy services to adult learners and their families will be decreased.

1. Organizations with an interest in literacy will share information about trends, issues and successes.

In order to share information we:

- held our semi-annual meeting in March and our annual meeting in September
- participated in the Raise-a-Reader campaign
- attended Board meetings in Ottawa with the Movement for Canadian Literacy (now called the Canadian Literacy and Learning Network)
- attended regular advisory committee meetings of Adult and Community Education at Holland College
- attended meetings with the Family Literacy Network
- attended the Board meetings for Workplace Education PEI Ltd
- attended a Board meeting for Adult and Community Education at Holland College

Barriers to people with low literacy levels will be reduced.

- 1. Adult learners will know how to access opportunities for learning.
- 2. People's learning needs will be properly identified.
- 3. Islanders will be able to use the printed material commonly found in the home, at work and in the community.

In order to reduce barriers we:

- sponsored the Summer Tutoring Program for Kids
- presented three plain language workshops to health professionals

- organized a celebration of International Adult Learners Week

Special initiatives:

This year the Board and staff formulated a two-year strategic plan. We wrote and approved abuse and harassment policies. We worked with consultants to produce both a human resources and communications plan. Staff took two days training at NALD in order to be able to update our website in a timely fashion. As a result, with NALD's assistance we have redesigned and expanded our website to include information for employers and jobseekers. Staff also took part in some social media workshops.

Project Reports

Family Literacy Day 2011

Over 300 people visited Family Literacy Day which was held at the Confederation Centre of the Arts.

This year we had performers such as Wade Lynch, the Music Man and Tanya Davis. Many community groups set up booths and talked with participants. The PEI Public Library Service set up their reading tent, led a lap sit activity and showcased their new website. Ocean 100 helped us promote the event with a week-long contest.

Sharing Our Gifts

Sharing Our Gifts is a two year project. The goal is to create a tool that will encourage families to do literacy activities at home. Jinny Greaves and Nora McCarthy are working together on this project. They have completed the first draft with guidance from an advisory committee. They have also started writing the facilitator's guide which will accompany the parent's guide. This summer they will hold a focus group with community facilitators to test the content of the guide. In the fall, they will hold focus groups for parents.

Igniting the Power Within

This project offered four training sessions to employment counselors in the four Atlantic provinces. Participants were taught how to use portfolios to help their clients improve their skills and to find employment. The first session was held last year. The second, third and last session were held in April, June and September 2010 respectively. Forty eight people took part in some or all of the session. Twenty five people attended all four workshops.

2010 Summer Tutoring Program for Kids

In May 2010 Jinny Greaves began planning the Summer Tutoring Program. She oversaw 26 tutors across PEI who delivered one-hour tutoring sessions to 800 elementary school children throughout July and August. Most of the tutors were B.Ed. students from UPEI who gained valuable practical experience. Tutoring was available in both French and English. We provided EAL tutoring to some new immigrant students. We held most sessions in community libraries thanks to the great support of the PEI Public Library Service.

With funds from the Post-Media Raise-a-Reader campaign, we were able to add resources for our tutors. Service Canada provided support through its Summer Jobs Program. The Department of Education, the Eastern, Western and French School Boards, the Charlottetown Royalty Rotary Club and Club Richelieu all contributed to help defray the salaries and travel costs of tutors. A special donation from the Telus Community Foundation allowed us to expand the program resources.

Adult Learners Week (ALW)

This year we went to Summerside Holland College and brought entertainers to the GED class. Lennie MacPherson made the crowd laugh with his comedy and Marc Haines had their feet stomping to his music. Kim McGrath Myers gave an inspirational speech and shared her story of going back to school.



Folk singer Valdy golfed with us and entertained the crowd at lunch time.



Treasurer's Report

The Alliance has had another prosperous year. In November we signed a new two-year contribution agreement with the Office of Literacy and Essential Skills valued at \$294,000. With this support we continued to promote literacy and essential skills across PEI.

Financial Highlights

 The Post Media Raise-a-Reader campaign headed by the Guardian and Journal-Pioneer newspapers raised \$23,800 and was held September 29, 2010. The funds raised were donated to our Summer Tutoring Program for Kids.



- 2. The 2010 Summer Tutoring Program for Kids hired 25 tutors and tutored 800 students. Our sponsors were Service-Canada, all the school boards, the Department of Education, the Public Library Service, Raise-A-Reader, Club Richelieu and the Rotary Club of Charlottetown Royalty.
 - This year the summer tutoring program received a grant of \$8500 from the Telus Foundation to hire extra tutors and develop some on-line resources for parents and tutors.
- 3. The 2010 PGI Golf Tournament for Literacy raised almost \$38,000 for literacy in PEI.
- 4. We received a \$5,000 grant from the PEI government to conduct a needs assessment with seniors regarding their health information needs. It was completed in December. This concludes a series of three needs assessments that will contribute to a policy paper for government.
- 5. An unexpected donation from Laubach Literacy of Canada gave us \$17,000 as part of their disbursement of funds when their organization dissolved.

The Alliance continues on a firm financial footing and we look forward to another successful year.


Bursaries Available
