Tom Hilton, Chair of the Board, welcomed everyone to our 25th Anniversary AGM. Tom introduced Members of the Alliance's Board. Quorum was established with 21 of 39 member group representatives present. Tom asked that the Minutes of the 2014 AGM be reviewed and moved that they be accepted. Alan Duncan seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Business Meeting

Treasurer's Report

Linda Fraser read the financial highlights of her Treasurer's Report.

Chairperson's Report & Executive Director's Report

Tom Hilton spoke to both the Chairperson's and Executive Director's Reports and addressed the challenges and successes the Alliance has had over the past year. Tom commended staff and Board for their hard work and dedication. He reviewed the Alliance's plan to provide three main programs in the coming year, the Summer Tutoring Program, PEI Volunteers for Literacy and the Love of Reading Program. Tom also thanked Trina O'Brien Leggott for her service as a Board Member with the Alliance. Trina is leaving the Board after providing much support and guidance over her 6 year term.

Review of Proposed By-Law Changes

Tom reviewed the proposed changes to by-law articles 3.1 and 3.4. The proposed change to article 3.1 would read: *Members of the PEI Literacy Alliance shall be organizations passionate about building a culture of literacy, learning and prosperity on PEI.* The proposed change to article 3.4 would read: *Every member organization has the right to: ii. Nominate a representative to be elected as a Director.*

Tom Hilton explained that the proposed changes would allow for-profit organizations with a stake in literacy and learning to be members. He emphasized the importance of working together to build a culture of literacy, learning and prosperity in PEI.

Mark Sandiford moved that the proposed by-law changes be accepted. Linda Fraser seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Nominations Report

Tom Hilton read the Nominations Report. The report states that we have room for 4 more Directors. Tom called for nominations from the floor three times. There were no nominations from the floor and no election was necessary.

Tom introduced 4 nominated Board Members: Roseanne Gauthier, Ron MacDonald, Nicky Hyndman and Sherri Barrett. Katherine McQuaid moved to accept all 4 nominees. Jennifer Bartlett-Bitar seconded. Motion carried.

Introduction of new Board Members

Tom Hilton introduced 4 newly appointed Board Members:

Nicky Hyndman is a Director on the Board of the PEI Home and School Federation. She is also an assistant professor at UPEI in the Family Science Program.

Sherri Barrett is the Director of Employment Services at the Mi'kmaq Confederacy.

Roseanne Gauthier is the Youth Services Librarian with the PEI Public Library Service.

Ron MacDonald is the Dean of Education at the University of Prince Edward Island. Ron is the newly appointed Chair of the Literacy Alliance.

Remarks from Incoming Board Chair

Ron MacDonald remarked that he is excited to join the Board at the Alliance and said that building a culture of literacy, learning and prosperity is a goal that is well aligned with his work at the Faculty of Education. He noted the excellent work that the Alliance does and is looking forward to helping the Alliance grow. Ron outlined the areas in which the Alliance will move forward including; filling gaps in literacy services through program development and delivery, promoting and celebrating of literacy and learning, and connecting educational stakeholders with the aim of building a culture of literacy, learning and prosperity. He noted that we will need to provide quantative and qualitive data that supports our programs and that we will need to work on publicizing that the inherent scope of literacy includes numeracy, amongst other skills. Ron also stated that in order for the Alliance to move forward with program development and delivery that we will need a five-year stable funding model.

Keynote Address

Tom Hilton introduced Elizabeth Beale, former President and CEO of Atlantic Provinces Economic Council and member of the Board of Economic Advisors to Premier MacLauchlan, Flizabeth addressed 'The Benefits of Literacy for Economic Prosperity'. Elizabeth began her address by stating that literacy policy is central to good economic policy. She commented that too many Canadians are being left behind, which is hurting our economy. Canada has an increasing demand for skills and a shrinking labor force and cannot afford to leave anyone behind. Elizabeth stated that commitment must be made from Government and the private sector to tackle the issue of low literacy. She cited that according to IALS and PIACC, a significant number of Canadians, 4 out of 10, have low literacy skills, which affects their ability to get and keep a job, participate in job training and participate fully in their community. She noted that according to the same studies, PEI is ranked in the middle of the pack compared to other provinces in Canada. However, PEI has a higher rate of graduation through its school system. She also stated that an improvement in literacy skills would improve labor market outcomes. She demonstrated the enormous demand for enhanced technology skills in the workforce and remarked that even traditional sectors are changing quickly and requiring a higher level of proficiency. Elizabeth cited that a 1% increase in the literacy skills of Canada's workforce will result in 2.5% more productivity, a return is 3 times higher than investing in equipment. She also commented on the lack of understanding from Government and the private sector on the returns of investing in literacy. Elizabeth closed the evening by saying that we need to realize that low literacy skills in the workforce is not a singular problem and does not have a one-sizefits-all solution. She underscored that Canada needs workplace education, adequate resources for those who have not graduated through the school system and skill development programs for immigrants. She also commented on the need to put pressure on the school system to ensure that students are not graduated without adequate skills. Elizabeth reminded everyone that although fixing these issues requires significant resources, an investment in literacy will build up the economy of PEI and Canada.

Adjournment

Ron MacDonald thanked Elizabeth and adjourned the meeting at 8pm.

Treasurer's Report



It is with pleasure that I am able to present the accounts of the PEI Literacy Alliance for the year ending March 31, 2016. As has been previously communicated, the lack of secure long term funding, especially from the Federal Government continues to be a major concern for the Alliance. As a result, the Alliance is reporting expenses in excess of revenue of \$58,624. Without a secure long term funding model, the long term future of the Alliance remains insecure.

The Board and Executive have lobbied vigorously for the re-introduction of the core funding model from the Office of Literacy and Essential Skills that was cut by the previous Federal

Government in 2014. Core funding was intended to help recipients run their organizations in an administratively sound and accountable manner to enable them to carry out their ongoing activities in support of their mandate and the needs of the literacy and essential skills field. Despite election promises and re-assurances from our local MPs, nothing has been put in place at the date of the report to replace this key source of funding support.

As a consequence of the funding shortfall, the Board has had to make difficult strategic decisions to conserve the funds of the Alliance. A number of activities previously undertaken were not offered in order to ensure the Alliance was able to provide key services to the community. The major initiative continues to be the Summer Tutoring Program for Kids. The Alliance thanks the funding partners, especially the Provincial Department of Education, Early Years and Culture and the Department of Workforce and Advanced Learning, for their continued support in making it possible to deliver this vital program across the province. In the summer of 2015, over 750 children were able to take advantage of the programming, keeping them on track to improve and increase their literacy skills.

Government funding continues to focus on the delivery of specific programs to achieve their goals. This funding model does not recognise the need for administrative support to be available to provide the structure, planning and co-ordination of these programs.

Treasurer's Report

The Alliance has ongoing administrative costs of just over \$100,000 annually that must be met from other sources. The PGI Golf tournament has been a major fund raiser for the organization. We thank all our supporters of this event that provided a \$26,091 contribution to the administration of programs through the Alliance. The Alliance has been able to draw on resources that have previously been accumulated, but these are being diminished and without significant secure long term funding the long term future of Alliance remain precarious.

I would like to thank the work of the Executive Director and staff, and of all the volunteers that continue to ensure the literacy needs of the Province are addressed and that activities are undertaken to address this unseen inhibitor to individuals' growth and prosperity.

Finally, a special thank you to all donors and supporters that help keep the Alliance afloat and able to address the literacy issues that still remain endemic on Prince Edward Island.

Chairperson's Report



Dear Friends of the Alliance,

I will begin my report by outlining the mandate of the PEI Literacy Alliance. We aim to:

- 1. Fill the gaps and services with respect to Literacy;
- 2. Deliver programs, such as the Summer Tutoring Program for Kids and the PEI Volunteers for Literacy Program;
- 3. Promote and Celebrate literacy and learning on PEI; and
- 4. Connect other educational stakeholders with the aim of building and supporting a culture of Literacy.

This time last year, the principle message at the AGM was that the Alliance is doing wonderful work, but funding is still needed, or our doors will close. A great deal of effort has gone into fundraising since federal funding was cut in June of 2014.

To date, with the great work of our staff, our doors are still open. They have been able to secure private donations and some funding through the Department of Workforce and Advanced Learning, in particular Skills PEI, the Department of Education, Early Learning and Culture and through fund raisers such as the Peter Gzowski Invitational Golf Tournament, the Raise a Reader Campaign (sponsored by the Guardian and the Journal Pioneer) and other means. Much energy has been put into fundraising. Thank you to Amanda Beazley, Jinny Greaves, Gina Hyson, Jane McIsaac (who coordinated the PGI tournament in 2016) and Kate Dempsey!

We were also able to keep our doors open by cutting programming, to some degree. In 2015, we tutored 759 students through the Summer Tutoring Program for Kids. In 2016, that number was reduced to just over 600 students. In 2015, we piloted a Mathematics Achievement Program which provided a fun camp for kids to play while learning math during teacher professional development days. In 2016, we will not be running the Mathematics Achievement Program. Of utmost importance, it must be shared that that the reserve of funds we have accumulated over many years will be depleted this time next year.

Chairperson's Report

It's also important to note that since 2014 our staff has been reduced from three fulltime positions to one full time staff with our Executive Director, Jinny Greaves, on temporary leave.

In 2017, there may not be an AGM. We, at this time, need federal funding returned, which has been promised during the election. We are grateful that our Provincial Government, our M.P.s and Senator Elizabeth Hubley support for the work of the Alliance. We have two key initiatives in the works to ensure that Federal funding is reinstated:

- 1. We have been successful in getting shortlisted for a Federal Call for Proposals for literacy and essential skills projects. The final document was submitted just this month, and we hope to hear back soon regarding this funding. This was a collaborative submission with Literacy Nova Scotia, Literacy Coalition of New Brunswick and Literacy Newfoundland.
- 2. Furthermore, in the spirit of collaboration and cooperation, we have formally joined forces with N.S, N.B and NFLD to form a regional Literacy coalition. We, as the coalition, have submitted a written submission to the House of Commons Standing Committee on Finance and hope to present to them in the coming weeks. This second federal ask will be for core funding to support our separate organizations as well as our collaboration. By working together, regionally, for the causes of Literacy, we see much benefit. We can learn and grow together.

So, while I say our doors may close, I am also optimistic that our doors will remain open, and that we will increase presence, our work and continue to improve literacy on PEI, as well as the region.

Our Impact

Over **21,000** books have been given to children and families in need across PEI through our **Free Books for Kids Program** since 2010.

10,244 children have been helped by our Summer Tutoring Program for Kids

362 Post-secondary students have been employed by the program.

96% of children maintained or improved their reading skills last summer.

Literacy Alliance

45% of working aged Islanders have low literacy skills. PEI Volunteers for Literacy is the only program that provides free tutoring for adults with low literacy skills in PEI.

93% of learners in the program have gained confidence in their skills.

\$135,250 has been awarded to adult learners who are working towards their GED through our Adult Learner Bursary Program since 2002.

30 elementary students attend free camp days throughout the school year in our Mathematics Achievement Program. This pilot program aims to build skills and confidence in kids who struggle the most in math.



\$30,000 is raised each year

through our **PGI Golf Tournament for Literacy** This money is used for literacy programs in PEI.

Raise A Reader

Staff and Board of the Alliance joined the efforts of The Guardian and Journal Pioneer and volunteers from across the Island to raise a recording breaking \$16,629.20 for literacy programs in PEI!





PEI Volunteers for Literacy

With funding support from the United Way of PEI and New Horizons for Seniors, we launched a free one-to-one tutoring program for adult learners who would like to improve their literacy skills. In October 2015, 12 volunteer tutors were trained and matched with 12 adult learners. This program runs year round and Island wide. We hope to expand the program in the fall of 2016.



Reading Town

The staff of the Alliance coordinated a one-week festival celebrating the love of reading in partnership with the National Reading Campaign and the Confederation Centre Public Library. The festival took place from May 2-9, 2015. Community groups, businesses and individuals hosted fun-filled events throughout the week. The Alliance participated in the installation of six tiny lending libraries in downtown Charlottetown.



Family Literacy Day 2015

Due to funding cuts, the Alliance has had to make some hard decisions about the programs we offer. Unfortunately, this year we were unable to host our annual Family Literacy Day celebration. However, the PEI Public Library Service did host smaller events in libraries across PEI.





Mathematics Achievement Program


