# Report from the Chair



Greetings fellow literacy supporters! It is difficult to believe that an entire year has passed since I accepted the position of Alliance Chair. The old adage “time flies when you are having fun” rings true once again. The PEI Literacy Alliance has continued to grow and evolve in response to two types of forces. There are external forces, for example needs and opportunities in the community, issues related to funding, or political decisions. In addition, the Alliance is directed by the ideas and commitment from within – the staff, board members, and its membership. The results of these external and internal forces have cumulated in an interesting, and potentially very formative, year.

## ***Looking Within – Community & Membership***

We continued to advance and celebrate literacy in Prince Edward Island both by taking the lead and participating in many ‘grass roots’ activities and events. Literacy Alliance bursaries and scholarships, the celebration of volunteers, the semi-annual meeting, and the PGI Golf Tournament have become traditions in the literacy community that have expanded throughout the province. The staff and board members succeed in educating on issues related to literacy within PEI, Canada, and on a global scale. The Alliance welcomes Kathleen Eaton and Wendy Shilton as new board members.

## ***Looking Around – Research***

The Literacy Alliance continues to mature in its facilitation of literacy-related research as it applies to our communities. I have observed a passion on the part of the Alliance staff and board members to learn more about literacy on a national and global scale. We look to new and innovative ways of creating learning opportunities for all and maximizing literacy-related interventions and innovations.

## ***Looking Ahead - Strategic Planning***

Last fall, huge questions were raised about the future of federal government funding to literacy coalitions across the country. Reactions to announcements and the uncertain atmosphere we lived in for several months caused a variety of responses. While the Alliance was greatly alarmed about the state of literacy funding for the province, the amount of support from individuals, membership groups and provincial institutions inspired us. The staff and board were motivated to take a determined, focused look at the current and future role of the Literacy Alliance and how our current organization and practices may need to change to further the literacy agenda of the future. We are committed to this process and – along with our other objectives and activities – we will continue to work in the area of strategic planning for the future health and productivity of the PEI Literacy Alliance.

# Executive Director's Report

Our Board indicates the direction for the organization through our "ENDS" or outcome statements, while the job of the executive director is to determine how to work toward these "ENDS".

The Board defines the ENDS statements and adds any elaboration to them. The Executive Director interprets these statements and decides how best to use the financial and human resources available to complete the work.

Here is a recap of our ENDS or outcome statements with some of the activities which helped achieve these ENDS.

## END A

*Gaps and overlaps in literacy services to adult learners and their families will be decreased.*

Organizations with an interest in literacy will share information about trends, issues and successes.

To help achieve this END some of the things we did were:

- held our semi-annual meeting in March and our annual meeting in September

- worked on the Learning Disabilities Steering Committee
- participated in the Raise-a-Reader campaign
- prepared a calendar page for ECDA calendar
- planned and hosted the Health and Literacy Summit
- met with the Premier, Minister and Deputy Minister of Health to express concern regarding a cut in funding to ABE programs
- responded to proposed cuts in federal literacy funding

## END B

*Barriers to people with low literacy levels will be reduced.*

Adult learners will know how to access opportunities for learning.

People's learning needs will be properly identified.

Islanders will be able to use the printed material commonly found in the home, at work and in the community.

# Project reports



On March 1st, 2007 the Alliance presented a Health and Literacy Summit. It marked the end of our two-year project called "Promoting Literacy in Healthy Public Policy" which was funded by Health Canada.

We gathered 80 health care professionals, health policymakers, learners and community group representatives to:

- gain an understanding of the connections between literacy and health
- discuss a working definition of "health literacy"
- develop a set of guiding principles for an all-government policy
- propose and the first steps in a five-year plan of action

At the end of the Summit, it was clear that a one day meeting was inadequate to develop a set of guiding principles for government. We proposed these next steps:

- an scan of exisiting health & literacy policies and practices
- a case study of one medical setting where efforts have been made to accommodate people with low literacy skills
- a follow-up meeting in the fall of 2007 to plan further action

Evaluations from participants were positive, and the PEI Literacy Alliance made many connections with people and organizations in the health field.

# *Project reports*

## **Fostering Plain Language in Public Education**

With this project, the Literacy Alliance worked with community groups to help them understand that many of their clients have literacy issues and require verbal, written and web page information in plain language.

### **Objectives**

The project objectives were to:

- develop collaborative partnerships with five community organizations
- identify information needs related to plain language
- increase awareness and understanding of the links between literacy and plain language

### **Activities**

To meet the objectives we:

- Worked with management and staff of community groups to conduct a literacy audit. Groups that participated included the Family Law Centre, Victim Services, Fitzroy Centre and the Mi'kmaq Confederacy.
- Conducted a needs assessment for plain language
- Held two “Principles of Plain Language” training sessions
- Produced a plain language training manual that is posted on our website

### **Evaluation**

The evaluation report found that the project activities were appropriate and successful in:

- Developing collaborative partnerships with Fitzroy Centre, PEI Teacher’s Federation, PEI Federation of Labour, Family Law Centre, East Prince Women’s Information Centre, Mi’kmaq Confederacy of PEI, and Workers Compensation Board
- Identifying the plain language needs of Fitzroy Centre, Family Law Centre, East Prince Women’s Information Centre, and Mi’kmaq Confederacy of PEI through the literacy audit process
- Increasing awareness of the links between literacy and plain language and the challenges faced by literacy learners through the literacy audits and ‘Cut the Gobbledegook’ workshops
- Developing collaborative partnerships with Fitzroy Centre, PEI Teacher’s Federation, PEI Federation of Labour, Family Law Centre, East Prince Women’s Information Centre, Mi’kmaq Confederacy of PEI, and Workers Compensation Board
- Developing a manual that meets the needs of users and supports the use of plain language

## Literacy Research Network

The PEI Literacy Research Network (LRN) is a unique partnership between the PEI Literacy Alliance and researchers from the University of PEI. The LRN is committed to helping community-based organizations develop action research projects that will:

- help make the work of the organization more effective
- improve the programs and services offered by that organization

The LRN fosters partnerships between experienced researchers and community organizations to help mentor new researchers within community organizations. The LRN also shares results of current and past literacy research as part of its mandate to build a literacy research culture on PEI.

# *Treasurer's Report*

In September 2006 the National Office of Literacy and Learning announced that literacy funding would be cut. After a lot of media attention and support from across the country, some funding was restored.

In November the Alliance received a 19-month grant that is finished in August 2008. The Adult Learning, Literacy and Essential Skills Program planned to issue another call for proposals in summer 2007.

Here are some highlights from the past year 2006-2007:

## **1) Federal Government Support**

We received a 19-month grant to carry out our literacy work until August 2008.

## **2) Raise-a-Reader**

The Raise-a-Reader campaign was organized by the Guardian and Journal Pioneer newspapers. They raised over \$30,000 for our Summer Tutoring Program.

## **3) The 2007 Summer Tutoring Program for Kids**

This year our program hired 25 tutors and tutored 760 students. Other sponsors for the summer program included Service-Canada, all the school boards, the Department of Education, the Provincial Library Service, the Mi'kmaq Confederacy, Club Richelieu and the Rotary Club of Charlottetown.

## **4) The 2007 PGI Golf Tournament for Literacy**

Our annual tournament raised over \$35,000 for literacy in PEI. Both Aliant and Atlantic Lottery Corporation provided generous sponsorships.

## **5) Plans for the Future**

The Alliance began a strategic planning exercise to help offset future budget or funding shortfalls we may experience. We hired a new staff member to help research funding opportunities and purchased the BIG Database of foundations as a resource.

Although the year was difficult and challenges remain, we continue to move literacy forward in PEI.
