





# Report from the Chair

Welcome everyone to the 2013 PEI Literacy Alliance AGM. It has been my pleasure to serve as Chair this past year and it is my final year as Chair. I will continue this coming year as Past Chair and I now pass along the scepter to Tom Hilton as he begins his first year as Chair.







This past year has been another busy one for the Alliance but it has also been a challenging one. For any nonprofit organization in this day of shrinking budgets, funding is always first and foremost on the agenda. Policy changes with the Office of Literacy and Essential Skills (OLES) have resulted in a change in how they fund Literacy Coalitions across the country. The staff members at the Alliance have taken these policy changes in stride and are being proactive in pursuing other opportunities. I wish them all the best in these endeavors and as always the board will work to support you.

Being from the world of Workplace Learning, I have to mention how much I enjoyed attending both the Breakfast and Learn and the Semi-Annual Meeting last spring with guest speaker Mario Allain, owner and president of Fundy Pros Specialty Construction in New Brunswick. Mario spoke about why and how he started a training school with his company and the benefits he and his staff have reaped from this initiative. His words are "I understood I had to change the culture, and let employees know that education and training was a positive thing. When the culture change started to take place, I saw stars coming from the woodwork." These examples of success go a long way to encourage others and I thank the PEI Literacy Alliance for inviting Mario to PEI to tell his story.

I would like to share a couple of other stories of success.



Terry Affleck learned to read at age 63. After 2 years of working with his tutor Micheline Dufour he could read a novel. The world opened up to him. At the 2011 PGI he was awarded the Learner Achievement Award by the PEI Literacy Alliance. In the fall of 2012 he was presented the 2012 Council of the Federation Literacy Award. At age 65 he enrolled at Holland College to prepare to get his GED. He wrote the GED exams in group writings twice but was still having difficulty passing Math and Language Arts Writing. After some individual sessions with an instructor at Workplace Learning Terry passed those exams and now has his GED! Congratulations to Terry for this tremendous accomplishment, your hard work and to all those who helped you along the way.

Blair Gray received the Learner Achievement Award from the PEI Literacy Alliance at the 2012 PGI. In his acceptance speech Blair spoke about the many health and learning barriers he had to overcome to work toward his goal of a GED credential and employment. Blair worked hard with his instructor Vaunda Richard, using Reading Horizons, a web based phonics program. As his reading skills improved he began to prepare to write his GED. I am very happy to report that in early summer Blair passed the GED exam. This credential along with his skills and experience has since landed him a job at JVI as a driving instructor. Well done!

Both these gentleman were successful because they worked very hard. They were also successful because they had support and encouragement along the way. I want to thank the PEI Literacy Alliance for the encouragement they provide to Islanders like Terry and Blair through their bursary and awards program. These stories must be told to motivate others who may be struggling. Please visit the PEI Literacy Alliance website to read other stories of achievement.

For this reason it has been my pleasure to be involved with the PEI Literacy Alliance as a member of the board. I have grown professionally because of it the experience and I have the utmost admiration for what you do. I wish you continued success.

Here are some of the activities which helped achieve these ENDS in 2012-2013.

**END A** 

Gaps and overlaps in literacy services to adult learners and their families will be decreased.

1. Organizations with an interest in literacy will share information about trends, issues and successes.

#### END B

Barriers to people with low literacy levels will be reduced.

1. Adult learners will know how to access opportunities for learning.

- 3. Islanders will be able to use the printed material commonly found in the home, at work and in the community.

- 2. Non-member organizations and businesses will recognize the implications and costs of low literacy.
